**What to Submit:** Applicants for the LatCrit Student Scholar Program must submit the following four items in hard copy or by email by **JANUARY 27, 2006**:

- A completed application form;
- A resume;
- A personal statement (no longer than one single-spaced page) explaining how the Student Scholar Program will further the student's intellectual and professional agenda;
- A previously unpublished paper, no more than 25,000 words long, on some topic related to race, ethnicity, and the law.

If materials are submitted electronically, they must be in either Microsoft Word or Corel WordPerfect format. Materials also must be in English.

**Paper Format:** Text, including footnotes, should be double spaced with 1-inch margins. Footnotes must conform to either the Harvard Bluebook or the University of Chicago Law School Manual of Style ("Maroon Book"). Papers may address any topic relevant to race, ethnicity, and the law, but the following themes are of particular interest:

- Papers that focus on Latinas/os as a distinct but diverse and transnational social group, and on the group's relationship to law or current legal regimes/practices. The idea is to "center" Latinas/os as Latinas/os in legal discourse, but to do so in a way that recognizes and accounts for the many axes of difference that help to define Latina/o heterogeneity, both domestically and internationally.
- Papers that speak to the overall theme of the Annual Conference. This year, the conference theme is "frontstage and backstage": an exploration of the relationship between the production and consumption sides of global tourist culture.
- Papers that bring a regional focus to the conference, corresponding to the conference locale. This year, regional papers would focus on Latino/a issues in the North American Southwest.

- Papers or panels that explore or elucidate cross-group histories or experiences with law and power, such as those based on class, gender, race, sexuality and religion.
- Papers and panels that connect with or contrast LatCrit theory to other genres of scholarship, especially theoretical approaches that critique class, gender, race, sexuality and other categories of social-legal identities and relations.
