

CERTIFICATE OF SPECIALIZATION IN GREEN TECHNOLOGY LAW

Students may undertake a specialization in the critically important and rapidly emerging field of “Green Technology Law.” The specialized curriculum program ensures that students develop a broad background in fundamental areas of the law while receiving advanced training in environmental, energy, and intellectual property law. Students who meet the requirements are awarded a Certificate of Specialization in Green Technology Law.

Students who wish to earn the certificate must take Administrative Law, Energy Regulation and the Environment, Environmental Law and Policy, and Introduction to Intellectual Property, as well as at least four advanced or more specialized courses from the following areas:

In addition, students can satisfy the advanced/specialized course requirement through approved related courses offered in other graduate schools on campus. Waivers and substitutions are considered on a case-by-case basis.

A student wishing to earn the certificate must also write a research paper on a related topic, and participate in an approved extra-curricular activity such as BERC@Boalt, Boalt.org, Berkeley Technology Law Journal, Healthcare and Biotech Law Society, Patent Law Society, or the Samuelson Law, Technology and Public Policy Clinic.
