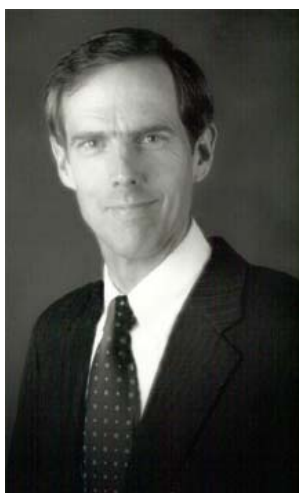


The Berkeley Center for Law & Technology (BCLT) is an independent research institute at the University of California, Berkeley, School of Law (Boalt Hall). The Center oversees Boalt's unparalleled law and technology program. BCLT's five faculty directors – Professors Mark A. Lemley, Peter S. Menell (Executive Director), Robert P. Merges, Pamela Samuelson and Howard Shelanski – teach the core courses and many of the advanced offerings in law and technology at Boalt. In addition, BCLT draws upon other Center-affiliated scholars as well as leading practitioners from its sponsoring law firms and technology companies to fill out the advanced curriculum.

During the 2000-2001 school year, BCLT hosted a number of events including a roundtable discussion series focusing on new media, an IP retreat for federal judges, and a conference focused on IP and antitrust law. For the 2001-2002 school year, BCLT will host a major conference looking at patent system reform and will present panel discussions focusing on careers in high technology, IP, entertainment law, and biotechnology law. In addition, BCLT will organize several judicial education programs throughout the year.

DEVELOPMENTS

- The Samuelson Law, Technology and Public Policy Clinic opened its doors in January, 2001, under the leadership of Deirdre Mulligan, formerly of the Center for Democracy and Technology. This innovative clinic has already begun work on cases, legislation, and administrative rulemakings in the areas of patents, privacy, and free speech on the Internet.
- Howard Shelanski rejoined the Boalt faculty in the summer of 2000 after serving as Chief Economist at the Federal Communications Commission. He became a Director of BCLT in the fall of 2001.
- Lon Sobel, Editor of *The Entertainment Law Reporter*, has been named a BCLT Distinguished Scholar. He will work with Professor Menell, David Nimmer, and lecturer David Given, in developing Boalt's entertainment law opportunities.
- Robert Blackburn, formerly Chief Patent Counsel at Chiron Corporation, has been appointed Distinguished Scholar from Practice at BCLT. Mr. Blackburn will concentrate on developing Boalt's biotech program.
- BCLT Director Professor Pamela Samuelson was named a Chancellor's Professor at University of California, Berkeley.
- Hon. Ronald M. Whyte (N.D. Cal.) has been named the recipient of the 2001 BCLT Distinguished Service Award.
- BCLT will inaugurate its Intellectual Property Scholarship class in the Spring 2002 semester. This program will bring 12 leading scholars to campus to present and discuss papers. In conjunction with the workshop, BCLT has instituted a Working Paper Series in Law and Technology.
- BCLT will cosponsor an annual intellectual property scholars conference with the intellectual property programs at DePaul College of Law and the Cardozo School of Law.
- For the third consecutive year, *U.S. News & World Report* has selected Boalt's Intellectual Property Program as number one in the nation.
- Professor Jane Kaufman Winn of SMU will be a Visiting Professor at the law school in the Spring of 2002. Professor Winn is one of the nation's leading experts in the law of electronic commerce.
- Professor Seana Shiffrin of UCLA will be a Visiting Professor at the law school in the Spring of 2002. Professor Shiffrin is a philosopher whose fields include the theory of intellectual property.
- BCLT Affiliate Professor Michael Katz of the Haas School of Business is on leave while serving as the Deputy Assistant Attorney General for Economics in the Antitrust Division. Professor Katz follows in the footsteps of BCLT Affiliate Professors Richard Gilbert (economics), Carl Shapiro (business), and Dan Rubinfeld (law), who each held the position during the Clinton administration.
- BCLT has developed a 1L Tech Law Mentor program in which first-year law students are matched with attorneys practicing in their area of interest.
- Patrick Riley, a recent graduate of the University of California, Berkeley ('01), has joined BCLT as Administrative Assistant. Patrick holds degrees in Environmental Biology, and Economics.

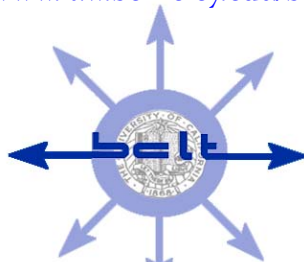
