Constituting the People

Many say the ideal of democracy presupposes the existence of a people but contributes nothing to its definition. In this Lecture I explain why this is wrong. Every democracy must try to constitute a democratic people, that is, a people who have a reasonable prospect of governing themselves democratically. Paradoxical as it sounds, constitutions can have a role in creating the people they are to govern.
