STEPHEN M. MAURER

Adjunct Professor of Public Policy and Law Berkeley Law

Stephen Maurer is an Adjunct Professor of Public Policy and Law at UC Berkeley. He also directs the Goldman School Project on Information Technology and Homeland Security. Professor Maurer's teaching and research interests include all phases of homeland security. He recently completed *WMD Terrorism* (MIT Press 2009), the first book-length survey of what is known about the subject. Between 2007 and 2009 he helped companies that make artificial DNA develop practical screening procedures so that members do not inadvertently sell their products to terrorists. The resulting private standard – which is significantly more stringent than US Government guidelines – has since been adopted by more than 85% of the



industry. Professor Maurer also has a long-standing interest in cybersecurity including an online course available at www.cs.washington.edu/education/courses/csep590/05au/lectures/.

Professor Maurer's other research interests include intellectual property law, antitrust, open source, and private sector self-governance. His work has appeared numerous journals including *Nature, Nature Biotechnology, Science, Bulletin of Atomic Scientists*, and *Economica*. Before coming to Berkeley, he practiced high technology law at leading firms in Arizona and California. Maurer holds a B.A. degree from Yale University and a J.D. in law from Harvard University.
