



David B. Oppenheimer

David B. Oppenheimer is Clinical Professor of Law at Berkeley Law, a position he has held since 2009. His previous service at Berkeley includes Director of the Boalt Hall Employment Discrimination Clinic, and Visiting Professor of Law.

Professor Oppenheimer has also served as Professor of Law and Associate Dean at Golden Gate University School of Law, and Visiting Professor of Law at Sciences-Po Ecole de Droit in Paris.

Professor Oppenheimer graduated from the University Without Walls (Berkeley) and Harvard Law School. He clerked for California Chief Justice Rose Bird, and thereafter worked as a staff attorney for the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing, prosecuting discrimination cases, before entering full time teaching.

He has presented scholarly papers on discrimination law at numerous universities, including Berkeley, Harvard, Yale, Stanford, Columbia, UCLA, Duke, Oxford, Sciences-Po, Heidelberg, the European University Institute (Florence), Kings College London, the Free University of Brussels, Humboldt University Berlin, the University of Lyon and the University of Paris, and at the annual meetings of the Association of American Law Schools and the American Political Science Association.

He has published articles on discrimination law in the *Pennsylvania Law Review*, the *Cornell Law Review*, the *Columbia Journal of Human Rights Law*, the *Berkeley Women's Law Journal*, the *Berkeley Journal of Employment and Labor Law*, the *European Anti-Discrimination Law Journal*, *Droit et Cultures*, *Revue de Droit Travail (Daloz)*, and many others, and was a contributor to MacKinnon and Siegel's *Directions in Sexual Harassment Law* (Yale University Press 2003) and Friedman's *Employment Discrimination Stories* (Foundation Press 2006). His co-authored book, *Whitewashing Race: The Myth of a Color-Blind Society* (with M. Brown, M. Carnoy, E. Currie, T. Duster, M. Schulz & D. Wellman) (University of California Press 2003) won the 2004 Benjamin L. Hooks outstanding book award. He teaches Civil Procedure, Comparative anti-Discrimination Law, and Leadership for Law Student Pro Bono Leaders, and directs the Berkeley Law program in Professional Skills.



Sheila Foster

Vice Dean and Professor of Law
Fordham University

Sheila Foster is Vice Dean and the Albert A. Walsh Professor of Real Estate, Land Use and Property Law at Fordham University. She is also a co-director of the Stein Center for Law and Ethics. Professor Foster is the author of numerous publications on land use, environmental law, and antidiscrimination law. Her works on antidiscrimination law include *Intent and Incoherence* (Tulane Law Review, 1998) and *Causation in Antidiscrimination Law: Beyond Intent Versus Impact* (Houston Law Review, 2005). She is also the co-editor (with David Oppenheimer and Sora Han) of a forthcoming casebook, *Comparative Equality and Antidiscrimination Law: Cases, Codes, Constitutions and Commentary* (Foundation Press, 2012). Much of her early work was dedicated to exploring the intersection of civil rights and environmental law, in a field called “environmental justice.” She is the coauthor (with Luke Cole) of *From the Ground Up: Environmental Racism and the Rise of the Environmental Justice Movement* (N.Y.U. Press) and coeditor of the 2nd edition of *The Law of Environmental Justice* (with Michael Gerrard 2008). Her most recent work explores and challenges the legal and theoretical frameworks in which land use decisions are made, particularly in the urban context. These works include *Collective Action and the Urban Commons* (Notre Dame Law Review, 2011), *Urban Informality as a Commons Dilemma*, (U. Miami Inter-American Law Review, 2009), *Integrative Lawyering: Navigating the Political Economy of Urban Development*, (California Law Review, 2007), and *The City as an Ecological Space: Social Capital and Urban Land Use* (Notre Dame Law Review, 2006).



Sora Y. Han

Sora Y. Han is Assistant Professor of Criminology, Law & Society at the University of California, Irvine. She received her Ph.D. from the Department of History of Consciousness at University of California, Santa Cruz, and her J.D. from University of California, Los Angeles, School of Law, with an emphasis in Critical Race Studies. Her research concerns philosophies of punishment, legal interpretation, and critical race and gender studies. She is currently working on a book, *Letters of the Law: Race and the Fantasy of Colorblindness*, which is a psychoanalytic reading of racial jurisprudence. Her publications have appeared in *Theoretical Criminology*; the *British Journal of American Legal Studies*; the *Stanford Journal of Civil Rights and Civil Liberties*; and the edited collections, *Feminist Interpretations of Adorno* and *Beyond Biopolitics*. She has worked as a legal advocate for women prisoners in California, and is co-editing a law casebook with David Oppenheimer and Sheila Foster, *Comparative Equality and Anti-Discrimination Law*, forthcoming from Foundation Press.
