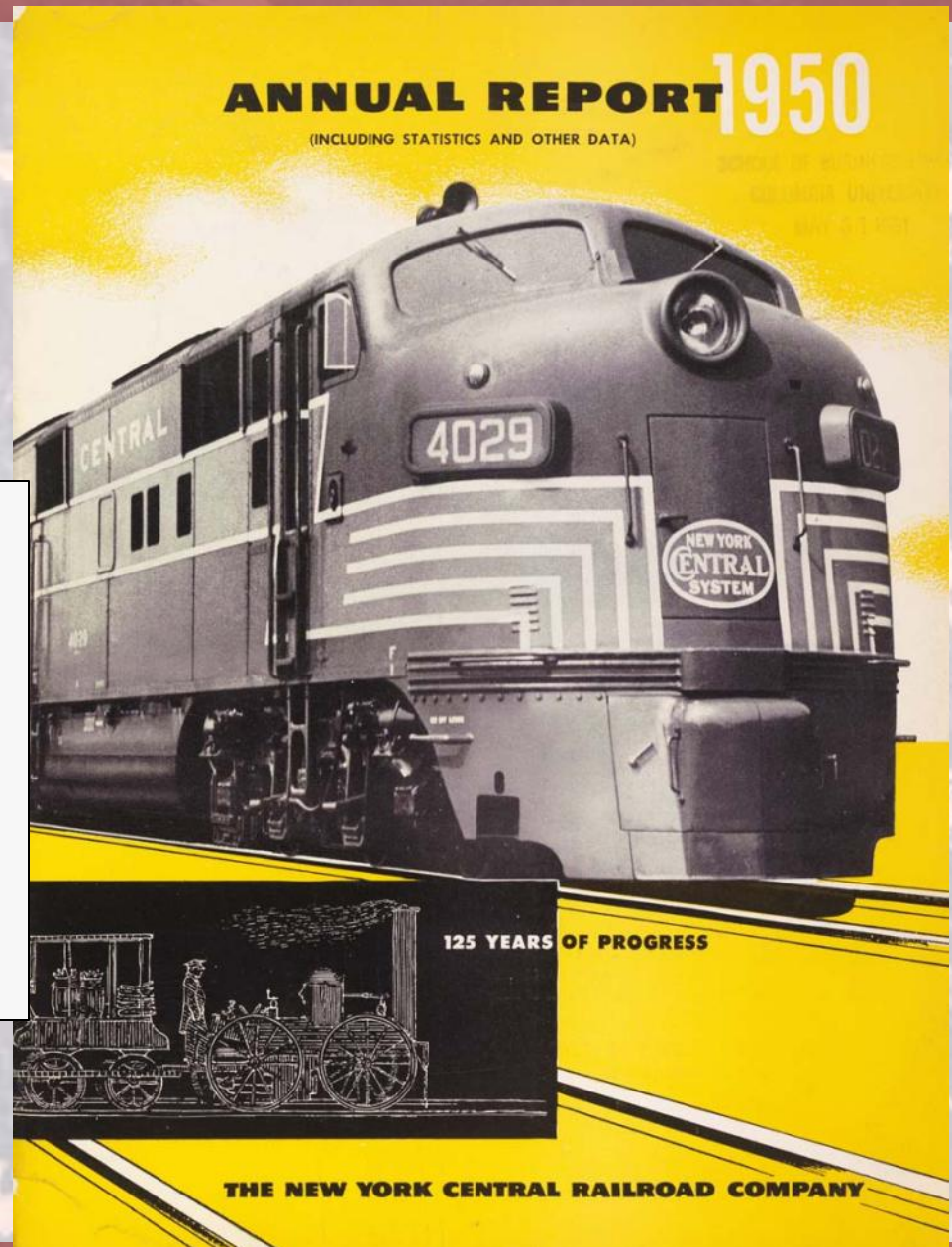

Dear ~~Mr.~~ Lehman:

I have just noticed, in the Congressional Record for September 14, 1951, the remarkable discussion in which Senator Welker of Idaho finally objected to the insertion of Joseph Alsop's articles on Budenz' testimony. May I say that I have the greatest admiration for your courage and courtesy under considerable pressure and provocation. I also admired your rapid and effective defense of the basic character of Ambassador Jessup last month when Senator McCarthy returned to the attack. As a Republican, I regret to say that I am persuaded that the courage and good sense you are showing will not go without its political reward, for in the end the American people are not going to be taken in by those who would use the smear in the guise of judicial process, or the fear of Communism as a refuge from offering alternative policies. But my political regrets are unimportant. What is important is that decency and honor and good sense should have a fighting voice in the Senate, and for your work in this cause I venture to offer my thanks as a citizen.
