
## find Non-Legal Research Databases?



Law students have access to both the <u>legal databases</u> maintained by the Law Library and interdisciplinary databases maintained by the <u>Main Library</u>. Both can be accessed via the Research tab on the <u>Law Library homepage</u>.

From the UC Berkeley Main Library homepage, you can conduct keyword searches for relevant databases, books, articles, journals, and other collections. You can also access an **A-Z list of available databases** by navigating to "Research Guides" via the Research heading.





The Main Library provides research guides on topics like <u>How to Find Articles and Databases</u> and <u>Text Mining and Computational Analysis</u>.



Available databases can be sorted by Subject, Type, and Provider. Database types include:

- News resources like <u>Access World News</u> and <u>ProQuest Major Daily</u>
  <u>Newspapers</u>, with current and historic local, national, and international news.
- Historic resources like <u>American History</u>, providing access to primary source documents from 1492 to 1945, and <u>Historical Statistics of the United States</u>, tracking historic demographic data and allowing data table creation.
- Specialized archival collections like <u>American Indian Newspapers</u> and <u>Congressional Research Service Reports</u>.

The Main Libary also provides access to several video streaming databases:



- Use **Kanopy** to find high-use local and indie films
- Use **Docuseek2** to find documentary films from independent producers
- Use **Academic Video Online** to find subject-area films on a variety of academic topics

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
